



Estes Park Health Foundation Funds Radios for Emergency Medical Services

In 2021, Rocky Mountain National Park changed digital capabilities to VHF frequency, which impacted Estes Park Health Emergency Medical Service's ability to communicate with RMNP during requests for medical assistance. Communication between RMNP and EPH EMS professionals is critical for appropriate management of resources as well as patient care during emergency situations in RMNP.

In response to this urgent need, Estes Park Health Foundation ran an emergency campaign to fund the \$31,000 cost of the new radios. The campaign was fully funded in weeks.

"Donors and individuals responded so quickly to this request," said Kevin Mullin, President of Estes Park Health Foundation. "Everyone at EPH Foundation and EPH EMS are grateful for the generous response. Rocky Mountain National Park has one of the highest search and rescue incidence rates in the country, and the new radios will allow for effective care in the field as well as continuity of care during and after transport."

The campaign was fully funded in weeks!

The new radios were put in service in August.







It's all about **PURPOSE**

A donor asked me recently about the purpose of an endowment. An endowment is a legal structure for perpetuating resources according to the will of its donors. Donors can choose to give to an endowment any time. Often, gifts to endowments are part of donors' estate plans so that their resources can help an organization when the donor no longer needs them.

At the end of 2020 (the most recent date of audited financials), the Foundation had an endowment of about \$1.8 million. In addition to the endowment fund, EPHF has other funds that are temporarily restricted by time or purpose according to the wishes of the persons who donated, and

those dollars are used when the restrictions are cleared.

Endowments are designed to keep the principal intact so that funds can grow over time. In fact, the Foundation Board is prevented from using the principal balance for grants or operations but can use the earnings for those purposes. How the funds are used is based on the wishes of the people who donated. Usually, funds used to build the endowment come from donations restricted to that purpose, and sometimes funds come from earnings of the existing endowment fund.

> Donations that are given to fund a specific project are always used for that project, and EPHF regularly reports

What is an Endowment Fund?

Endowment funds are used by non-profit organizations to secure the longevity of their missions. Because the principal balance is maintained and only investment earnings can be used for operational expenses, donations to Estes Park Health Foundation's Endowment Fund ensure the Foundation can give the gift of good health for years to come.

THE CASE FOR ENDOWMENT

Let's assume an endowment fund earns a net total return averaging 7% per year. Furthermore, this endowment fund has a payout policy allowing a 41/2% distribution.

A contribution of \$10,000 to this endowment fund 100 years ago would:

- · Distribute \$5,187 this year
- · Have a value of \$118,137 this year
- · Have distributed \$194,647 over the years

Endowment funds take advantage of the miracle of compounding interest,



EPH Department WISH LIST

The COVID-19 pandemic and 2020 wildfires brought forced closures, limited services, and unbudgeted expenses to EPH. Outside of emergencies, capital expenditures are on hold in 2021. If you have the capacity to support a department at EPH, your funds can directly purchase critical supplies and equipment. Med/Surg

EPH Med/Surg needs K-Pads to assist patients with pain control and discomfort. K-Pads serve as a heating or cooling pad for patients and are useful in a variety of circumstances, including post-surgery. K-Pads can be used to cover large surface areas of the body as well as extremities. By using circulating water, K-Pads deliver consistent temperature to target tissues over time.

Cost per Unit: \$450 - QTY Needed: 2

Emergency Medical Service (EMS)

EMS needs Portable Suctioning Units, which are used to effectively clear an airway in an emergency situation. Portable Suction Units are a mainstay in every hospital and are used to remove respiratory secretions when a patient is unable to do so themselves, assist a patient that is vomiting or seizing while unconscious, clear blood from an airway, or remove a foreign substance from a patient's windpipe and/or lungs.

Cost per Unit: \$590 — QTY Needed: 8

Pediatrics (Neonatal)

Estes Park Health Pediatrics needs a mannequin for their Neonatal Resuscitation Program. Newborn Anne™ is a mannequin that represents a full term, 50th percentile newborn female. She's used for critical skills training required to resuscitate a newborn in the first 10 minutes of life. She can be intubated, have lines placed, and accommodate interosseous needles and chest needles in a realistic fashion. Her airway is designed to allow for all aspects of training in newborn airway management, including the use of positive-pressure airway devices, placement of ET tubes and LMAs. The torso includes functionality to relieve tension pneumothorax via needle decompression, and she has IO access in both legs. Her patent umbilicus has a manually generated pulse that can be assessed, cut, and catheterized for IV access. This tool is essential for EPH staff training.

Cost per Unit: \$2,900 — QTY Needed: 1

Pediatrics (Vision Screener)

Estes Park Health Pediatrics needs a vision screener, which tests the vision of children as young as 6 months for problems like farsightedness, nearsightedness, blurred vision, unequal refractive power, eye alignment, and unequal pupil size. Use of a vision screener is ideal for early intervention programs targeted at special needs, pre-verbal, and preschool children. Early detection can save a child's vision. The vision screener provides results in seconds and can import and export vision screening records directly into EPH's EPIC Electronic Healthcare Record system. Patients who need follow up care receive a one-page screening result to take to their eye care specialist.

Cost per Unit: \$8,000 — QTY Needed: 1

Paint Estes Pink 2021

Paint Estes Pink is a weeklong initiative put forth by Estes Park Health Foundation to raise money for cancer services at Estes Park Health. The week culminates in Pink Night at the Rooftop Rodeo where Paint Estes Pink Competition Winners are announced.

The Cause

In its 8th year, Paint Estes Pink raised funds to purchase a new MRI machine at Estes Park Health. MRIs are often used to diagnose certain types of cancer and to see if cancer has spread to other parts of the body.

The current MRI machine at EPH is 14 years old, and due to its age, requires more and more repairs and maintenance. EPH gives 5-6 MRIs each day, downtime for maintenance means less availability for use, and the machine is near end of life.



The Crowns for the Care Competition enlists local women to raise funds to win the title of Mrs. Rooftop Rodeo, announced during Pink Night, which is Saturday night of the Rooftop Rodeo in July. Starting June 1, women raise money to benefit oncology services at Estes Park Health. This year, 100% of funds raised go toward the purchase of a new MRI machine.

Five women competed in the Crowns for the Care Competition in 2021: Melissa Addison, Dona Cooper, Lisa Hohensee, Sonja McTeague, and **Stacey Tabor**. These local volunteers raised \$26,870 as a group with **COOPER** winning the Mrs. Rooftop Rodeo crown by raising over \$19k in donations, a new record.

The Foundation sends out a special thank-you to the contestants and also to the Past Mrs. Rooftop Rodeo Queens who donated countless hours of their time to serve as mentors and support staff. Fundraising like this truly takes a village.

Business Fundraising

To raise funds for Paint Estes Pink, local businesses display collection jars during Rodeo Week or donate a portion of profits to Paint Estes Pink. The business that raises the most funds receives a custom award to display for a year. Water Wheel Gift Corner won this award in 2021. The Foundation is so grateful for everyone that participated, including the Estes Park Mountain Bike Team, who dropped off and collected donation jars.

Celebrate Pinktober:

Honor a Cancer Warrior at Estes Park Health

October, or Pinktober as many now call it, is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, and EPHF will spend the month raising awareness of early detection and honoring breast cancer warriors.

According to the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services, breast cancer is the second most common form of cancer found in women, and about 1 in 8 women in the United States today will have breast cancer at some point in their lives. If discovered early, women have up to a 90% chance of survival, whereas survival drops to about 15-20% if found in later stages. To increase rates of early detection, Estes Park Health Foundation fully funded bringing 3D mammograms to Estes Park Health in 2019, and 3D mammograms have been available at Estes Park Health since May of 2020.

Most insurers cover the cost of mammograms every 1-2 years for women aged 40 and over. Call 970-586-2317 to schedule your mammogram.
