



The Power of Endowment

In 2011, EPH Foundation donor Ruth Ann Southwick passed away. Like many retirees living in Estes Park, she spent her summers in Estes Park and winters in Arizona. She used services at Estes Park Health and decided to leave a generous estate gift. Southwick gave just over \$450k to the endowment fund at EPH Foundation in 2011. An endowment fund is a legal structure for perpetuating resources according to the will of its donors. While most give to an endowment fund as part of their will, gifts can be made at any time. Endowment funds are designed to keep principal intact so that funds can grow over time. In fact, the EPHF Board is prevented from using the principal balance for grants or operations but can use earnings.

Since 2011, EPHF's Endowment Fund has earned an average of 10.5% each year, which means that Southwick's contributions now amount to \$1,221,336. Her original investment of \$450k has earned \$771,336 in interest over 10 years. This is the magic of compounding interest and the reason why donations to endowment funds perpetuate the missions of nonprofit organizations for years to come.

The Foundation funds projects for EPH each year through a combination of funds raised from contributions and dollars earned through endowment investment gains (if applicable). What is an Endowment Fund?

Endowment funds are used by nonprofit organizations to secure the longevity of their missions. Because the principal balance is maintained and only investment earnings can be used for operational expenses, donations to Estes Park Health Foundation's Endowment Fund ensure the Foundation can give the gift of good health for years to come.

THE CASE FOR ENDOWMENT

Let's assume an endowment fund earns a net total return averaging **7% per year**. Furthermore, this endowment fund has a payout policy allowing a **4½% distribution**.

A contribution of \$10,000 to this endowment fund 100 years ago would:

- Distribute \$5,187 this year
- Have a value of \$118,137 this year
- Have distributed \$194,647 over the years

Endowment funds take advantage of the miracle of compounding interest, a phenomena Albert Einstein called the 8th Wonder of the World!







A New MRI Machine in 2022

In 2021, the Foundation Board & Staff focused on raising funds to bring a new MRI machine to Estes Park Health. The current machine is 14 years old and near end of life, which means finding replacement parts for repairs is difficult. Due to the machine's age, more and more repairs are needed, equaling downtime for the machine and less availability for patient use.

Due to generous support of individuals, foundations, and businesses, Estes Park Health Foundation raised over \$530k to help fund this equipment.


Brigitte Foust, Director of Diagnostic Imaging, negotiated a discounted price of \$1.1 million to purchase and install the Siemens Magnetom Altea 1.5T, an MRI machine that has many benefits including:

- Shorter scan times; reduced exam times by 50%
- Diagnostically superior images
- Better patient comfort with 4 inches more space in the machine
- Adjustable exam coil for exceptional patient positioning
- Prostate exams don't require the use of a rectal coil
- Quiet Suite Technology reduces noise during exams

The machine will be installed in July of 2022.

EPH will fund the balance to purchase the machine and is the only MRI provider in the Estes Valley. This mountain community both needs and deserves access to state-of-the-art healthcare here in Estes Park rather than being forced to drive or be transported to the Valley for services.



March is Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month

Colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of cancer-related deaths in the United States for both men and women combined.

"Though colorectal cancer is prevalent, it is a disease that can be prevented through routine screenings, DR. McLELLAN a healthy diet, and regular

exercise," explained Jennifer McLellan, MD, a general surgeon and endoscopist at Estes Park Health.

Colonoscopy is considered the best test for colorectal cancer screening and is available at Estes Park Health. Other screening tests available include flexible sigmoidoscopy (a visual examination of the rectum and lower portion of the colon), testing the stool for blood (fecal occult blood testing or fecal immunochemical testing), and fecal DNA testing.

The risk of developing colorectal cancer increases with age. All men and women 45 and older are at risk for developing colorectal cancer and should be screened. Some people are at a higher risk and should be screened at an age younger than 45, including those with a personal or family history




of inflammatory bowel disease; colorectal cancer or polyps; or ovarian, endometrial, or breast cancer.

Since there are very few symptoms associated with colorectal

cancer, regular screening is essential. Colorectal cancer is preventable if polyps are detected and removed and is often curable if the cancer is detected in its early stages.

"If detected, colorectal cancer requires surgery in nearly all cases, sometimes in conjunction with radiation and chemotherapy," said Dr. McLellan. "Between 80-90% of patients regain normal health if the cancer is detected and treated in the earliest stages. However, the cure rate drops to 50% or less when diagnosed in the later stages."

Colorectal cancer screening costs are covered by Medicare and many commercial health plans. Schedule an appointment with your physician at Estes Park Health to find out what screening methods are right for you.

EPH Diagnostic Imaging

Diagnostic Imaging needs a new ultrasound table. The current table is over 10 years old and needs to be replaced. Ultrasound tables provide a flexible, dynamic surface that improves the quality of images and enhances safety and comfort for patients and sonographers. At EPH, ultrasounds are used to view the uterus and ovaries during pregnancy, monitor a developing baby's health, evaluate blood flow, guide a needle for biopsy or tumor treatment, examine a breast lump, check the thyroid gland, detect genital and prostate problems, assess joint inflammation, evaluate metabolic bone disease, and more.

Cost per Unit: \$7,495 - \$1,400 remaining
